- Rich Corbello goal is to advocate for older adults and insure for independence. Calaveras
 County has 8 seats, 2 filled, 6 vacancies. Committee meets six times per year. We review and
 approve plan updates to meet needs of the communities. We receive training, conduct
 community survey every four years.
- Kristen Knowha Area 12 Director Agency for Aging thanked Rich for coming and speaking. We really need help and imperative we get seats filled. Needs assessment will be put on website this afternoon. Did a statewide survey as well and those findings will be in our report too. Trying to keep elderly folks' home repair done, yard work done, and fear of falling. Hosted a workshop with UC Davis and UCSF, we had 55 attend and it was well received. Will host another event on May 15 in Tuolumne County at the Resilience Center. We are in the early planning stages but will keep everyone informed and updated. Will be open to Calaveras residents. Will place two resource kiosks in the county, one in San Andreas and one at Angels Camp library. They are like large IPads and it is all touch screen and is filled with lots of resource information. Will have printer so people can take home information. Common Ground Senior Services will not be seeking extension re meal and home transportation. We would like to thank them for 24 years of service. We have started the request the RFP process. We are hoping to bring to BOS for approval in June and hoping to have the new service provider in place by July 2024. Calaveras County provides the match cash every year. In 2022/23 - County provided \$100,802, we provided \$564,000 worth of services to residents in Calaveras County. For every \$1 the County gave us, the residents of Calaveras County received over \$5 of services. This is a great investment of your dollars.
- **Supervisor Huberty** thanked them for all they do and the services they provide. Honor to be on this board.

- 28. Ordinance Planning (ID # 7754) 1) By a 4/5 vote, adopt Chapter 17.75 of the Zoning Code, an interim urgency ordinance to regulate the demolition and alteration of certain historic buildings and structures; 2) find the adoption of the ordinance to be within the scope of the 2019 General Plan Environmental Impact Report.
- Gabriel Elliott Planning Director power point presentation presented. Please review for detailed information.
- Interim Ordinance Regulating Historic Structures in the County.
- Calaveras County contains many historic structures.
- Purpose of the Ordinance The General Plan calls for the preservation of the County's historic resources. General Plan Implementation Measure COS-8G requires the County to develop a cultural resource management ordinance that includes the establishment of a County register of historic resources and requires a cultural resource study prior to demolition of buildings 75 years or older. General Plan Implementation Measure COS-8H requires the use of the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Treatment of Historic properties (19920 as a guide for evaluating development proposals involving cultural resources.
- Applicability Buildings or structures at least 75 years or older that are listed on the National Register of Historic Places or has been determined to be eligible for the National Register, or listed on the California Register of Historic Places, or have been determined by the State Historical Resources Commission to be eligible for listing in the California Register of Historical Resources.
- Additional Review Required Chief Building Official requests Planning Director's
 determination of whether a parcel under review contains a listed historical building or
 structure. If the Parcel contains a listed historical building or structure, Chief Building Official
 shall not issue a building or demotion permit until a Conditional Use Permit has been
 approved by the Planning Commission. Chief Building Official shall apply the State Historical
 Building Code if the parcel contains a listed historical building or structure.
- Limited Scope Conditional Use Permit Review of the application for a CUP under this Chapter shall be limited to a review of potentially significant impacts to the listed historical building or structure. If carrying out the proposed construction or demolition activity will result in one or more potentially significant impacts to the listed historical building or structure, conditions of approval may be required. If conditions of approval will not suffice to reduce the potential impacts to the listed historical building or structure to less than significant, the application may be denied. CEQA or NEPA review shall be limited in scope of discretionary review authorized by this Chapter. CEQA or NEPA compliance shall be the responsibility of the Planning Director.
- Panel Review of Limited Scope CUP CUP application shall be reviewed and reported on within thirty days by a panel consisting of: Planning Director or designee; Chief Building Official or designee; Designee of the Calaveras County Historical Society. Purpose is make sure there is independent judgment re a specific structure.
- Review Panel Responsibilities Determine whether the proposed construction or demotion activity will result in one or more potentially significant impacts to the listed historical building

- or structure. Describe identified potentially significant impacts in writing. Describe in writing what, if any, requirements or conditions can be feasibly Imposed as a condition of the County's approval that will reduce impacts to the point of insignificance. Planning Director submits recommendations for CEQA compliance to Planning Commission.
- Planning Commission Review Findings of the Planning. Commission: That CEQA has been complied with. That approval of the permit is consistent with the General Plan and any applicable Community Plan. That the proposed activity involves a structure or building described in County Code. That Commission has read and considered the report prepared by the review panel. Explanation of what conditions of approval will be imposed and why they are required to reduce potential Impacts to the historical characteristic of the building or structure to the point of insignificance.
- Discretionary Permits Involving Historic Structures When regular CEQA and permit review as required for the permit. Examples: use permits, zoning amendments, maps. Review of historic structures is just one part of CEQA cultural resource analysis. But this part will be done using panel review.
- Nuisance Declaration Failure to comply with this ordinance is unlawful in all zones and constitutes a public nuisance that may be abated as described in Chapter 8.06 of the County Code. Planning Director may revoke a permit issued under this Chapter at any time that there has been noncompliance with one or more of the provisions of this chapter and/or the conditions of the permit. Inspections of the building or structure at issue and the surrounding premises and grounds may be conducted by the Planning Director, the Chief Building Official, or their designees during business hours without prior notice. Failure to grant entry can result in a warrant.
- Nuisance Declaration Whenever any County enforcement official determines that a public nuisance exists within the unincorporated county, he or she is authorized to utilize the enforcement, abatement, cost recovery, and administrative hearing provisions described in Chapter 8.06 of the county code, including, as necessary, the summary abatement provisions of that chapter. In any enforcement action brought to enforce the provisions of this chapter, each parcel owner, permittee, or occupant who causes violation shall be jointly and severally liable for all resulting administrative fines and for any and all actual costs of enforcement incurred by the county, including all allowable attorneys' fees. Each activity that violates this Chapter shall be an infraction. Each day that a violation of this Chapter continues unabated shall constitute an independent violation.
- Effective Date and Duration Pursuant to Government Code section 65858, this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption but shall expire within forty-five days if not first extended by a 4/5 vote at a subsequent noticed public hearing of the Board of Supervisors.
- Supervisor Tofanelli re 75 year old building, anytime a permit comes in re a 75+ year old house, you have to go through this entire process? Sarah Edwards - County Counsel - no, has to be 75 years old and listed on the registry, only for things that already require a permit for the county.
- Supervisor Folendorf state and national are different, and things are different for historical sites. We need to reflect in the code if we are referring to state or national because they are very different. Sarah Edwards - yes, they are different but it is determined when it is applicable.
- Chair Garamendi question is eligibility, to be eligible under the codes, is pretty broad. Sarah
 Edwards yes, will be determined by the federally qualified expert for federal register or state
 register. Eligible is a term of art. If BOS wants to restrict it, that is something they can do.
 Example, an owner can say they don't want their eligible structure on the list and it will not be
 put on the list.
- Doug Oliver Chief Building Official as it is written, if the building is known on the state
 register or is eligible, we would need to go through use permit process. If there is no eligibility,
 we would not require they go through the CPU process. Re eligibility, if BOS takes them off, it
 will effect how people make choices because they may not be able to apply to funding. We
 want to encourage as much participation, you get tax reduction and other programs we don't

control but want to encourage people to participate in. We would want people to be on the register and eligible to be on it. People could then seek an eligibility. Private owner can seek the process and we don't want to discourage that.

- Sarah Edwards County Counsel if structure is on federal list, it is eligible for the state but may not be on the state.
- Gabriel Elliott we have a local resource that has a list of property on state historic register
 and eligible. The information is not regularly shared because they want to keep it confidential.
 They can provide us that list and identify the property.
- Chair Garamendi I feel this is listed as a blanket ordinance that any building 75+ years old
 is eligible. Sarah Edwards that is not our intention. Reviewed ordinance and showed where
 that is not how it is written. Chair Garamendi concerned about this broad language, how it
 may impact a lot of people in this community.
- Doug Oliver we have not had to make this determination very often. I believe only four in my
 career, and only one was a dwelling, usually a building in the downtown or state historic park.
 Historic preserve is not always convenient but meant for historic buildings is maintained. It is
 always negotiable and we want to keep the historic integrity of the building.
- Gabriel Elliott if your concern is cost, we may want to address a different cost analysis for that; impose a different fee for a limited scope CUP versus a full CUP. Chair Garamendi sounds good.
- Supervisor Huberty re list, old list that was being modified. Where are we with that. Gabriel Elliott has a list that shows which are on the state or federal historical list; e.g., Copperopolis site. I did not bring the list with me of all the sites which includes buildings, bridges, etc. If someone wants to apply for relief through the Mills act, financial assistance, they can. Supervisor Huberty there is a passion for people who take on these projects, I believe they have the best interest at heart.
- Chair Garamendi my concerns are many fold; using an urgency ordinance to accomplish this. This is a hole we should have filled a long time ago. I am concerned about getting public input. I would like to take this through the Planning Commission and public process and a time certain. My main concern is terms with eligibility. We got this on Wednesday afternoon, haven't had time to digest this. Eligibility is very subjective. Other concern is construction and alteration. Are we keeping building from being torn down. It is a bit subjective. Final issue is how documentation is written. We need to be thoughtful so we don't have unintended consequences.
- **Doug Oliver** re eligibility, if we agree on premise there may disagreement over language, if BOS agrees it should be implemented the way counsel has written it, we will agree enforcement means 75+ years and on the state or federal registry or the state has recognized it is eligible. We can write appropriate procedure based on that direction.
- **Gabriel Elliott** we can limit it to demolition only but moving forward we need to look at alteration. If concern is we don't want buildings demolished without vetting, we can do that. **Sarah Edwards** re interim ordinance, would only be applicable for demolition purposes. In permanent ordinance, it will require it to be broader per law. **Gabriel Elliott** it will go through planning process, we can have committee meetings for the public.
- Supervisor Foldendorf I feel this ordinance is late and we are abnormal in that we don't have an ordinance. It is not an easy decision when you get to the point of demolition but in my experience there is public forum, negotiations and usually a compromise. I think this ordinance is a good step in the right direction and we can learn from other counties re the public process. There are many buildings in all of our districts and buildings will be threatened if we don't do something about it. We need to take the first step in the right direction.
- Supervisor Huberty with property ordinance, we will be able to get state and federal grants as Doug Oliver stated.
- Chair Garamendi I think this is important but question whether this is an appropriate emergency ordinance and concerned re ambiguity between construction and renovation, if limited to demolition. Want to preserve our county and want to make sure out intent is clear. This has not been a public process.

- Supervisor Tofanelli final ordinance will come back to us and will have a lot more than the demolition and will show. I understand your concern but don't feel we will have a lot of leeway when it comes back to us due to the state and federal requirements. It will come back to us inn 45 days. During that time, we can work with staff to incorporate some of your concerns.
- **Gabriel Elliott** we may want to wait until there are five BOS members present as it requires a 4/5 vote. We may want to continue to another date to work things out. The actual ordinance will be more detailed and require additional language and work out the detail over time.
- **Doug Oliver** 45 days won't be enough to bring a full ordinance, but maybe add a sentence.
- Sarah Edwards interim ordinance is only in place for 45 days but can be extended. If there is cleanup or typos we can do those at that time. Would rather make changes today than 45 days from now. BOS can direct changes or edits.
- Chair Garamendi can we do a redline today and take a break for you to prepare it. Sarah Edwards yes. BOS can limit in scope to demolition.
- BOS make changes now, take a break and reconvene.
- Sarah Edwards County Counsel put amendments on the screen but it was too small to read. Removed references to alterations or construction permits and limited to demolition permits. More limited in scope.
- Opened up for public comment again due to new version. No additional public comments.

Public Comment

- Christopher Mandel Executive Director of Calaveras Historical Society and resident of Sheep Ranch we have an important problem that won't cost the county any money. Double Springs Courthouse was preserved, Altaville School House was restored, Red Barn was preserved, downtown buildings were slated for demolition for a parking structure but the previous Executive Director preserved them. This ordinance is well done and helps our rural county. Ordnance is a roadmap for property owners and agencies. Calaveras County is a special place and what makes it special is its historical places that people world wide come to see. We have a responsibility to these buildings to keep them preserved.
- Judith Marvin Murphys resident architectural historian for over 40 years for federal, state, county, city, private industry - CEQA supersedes all ordinances. It is important that we have this demolition ordinance. In Murphys we are about to lose the oldest continuous school in California. We have to preserve these buildings because that is why people are coming to our county.
- Sal Mano- President of the Society of the Preservation of Western Calaveras County here because of threat of demolition of Valley Springs train station. This vote isn't just about the train depot, we don't have a code which is required and failure to determine to community and county. Details needs to be worked out and put out to the public. If the interim ordinance is not passed today, the train depot is destroyed before a permanent ordinance is established, it will be clear who will be responsible for that and that is why there is an urgency to this ordinance.
- Julia Costello Mokelumne Hill Resident archeologist Sal said it very well, this is a 45 day ordinance. Beautiful barn was in our town, was going to be torn down. The barn disappeared and it galvanized our town. We had a town ordinance and we passed it for our town.
- Jill Vergance local journalist and writer my family has been here for 3 generations. In February 1850, our county was established. We have some of the oldest and significant buildings in the state and for the gold rush period. These structures need a voice and they need it now. I am asking it be yours.

- Supervisor Tofanelli attended COG meeting. CalTrans said they were awarded \$300M for charging stations in CA. I said since there are 58 counties, we would like 5 for our county.
 AT&T has sent letters out to people re landlines in Calaveras County, this puts a lot of elderly people at risk without a phone. Is the BOS interested in sending a letter to AT&T asking them not to do that. BOS agreed to send letter to AT&T. Admin will put letter together for BOS and ready for approval at next meeting.
- Supervisor Folendorf attended COG meeting, attended Calaveras Transit Authority (CTA) meeting, compared to last year our ridership is up 46.7% using Calaveras Connect, huge increase, last year there were 12,641 riders, 18,548 riders this year. One of the biggest increase is to Columbia College. Attended the ? Processor stakeholder meeting, had approximately 40 people present. Good conversation.
- Supervisor Huberty 29th attended meeting re homelessness; on 31st attended meeting re crosswalk situation at Michelson school, on 1st attended Agency on Aging, on 5th attended Utica Town Hall, on 7th Cal Trans meeting re upper Hwy 4 corridor.
- Chair Garamendi reminded BOS, I am part of an adhoc committee we are calling
 Williamson Act 2.0, reached out to staff and practitioners re their point of view re law, hoping to
 present real legislative improvement to the act. Golden State Connect Authority continues to
 do their work. Sierra Nevada Conservancy has a meeting coming up to get some projects up
 in Calaveras County.
- Teresa Hitchcock CEO met with Utica Power and Water re exemption, requested formal letter from BOS to consider. Supervisor Huberty - still has some work to do. Teresa Hitchcock - will meet with Supervisor Huberty to get the work and wording done.
